

Watch Professors **Zeinabu Davis** (UCSD/Comm) and **Caroline Collins** (UCSD/USP) discuss Davis's early films *Crocodile Conspiracy* and *Compensation* courtesy of the UCLA Film & Television Archive, tracing an important lineage of filmmaking within the L.A. Rebellion movement. The Walker Arts Center features a clip of *Compensation* which will be showing in restored form at the 2024 New York Film Festival this fall. The restoration was made for the Criterion Collection with support of the UCLA Film and Television Archive and the Sundance Institute.

After its premiere, Compensation will have a special screening at the Chicago International Film Festival on October 27 and then a nationwide theatrical release beginning in February 2025. The San Diego premiere will be hosted by the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego in the current exhibition For Dear Life: Art, Medicine, and Disability.




On the road with Nicoletta Vangelisti (Communication & Critical Gender Studies/PhD candidate)

"Chorus of Sojourners" in the studio of artist Woodrow Nash in Akron, OH. These are miniatures of the statue [Nash] cast which was placed in the Sojourner Truth Legacy Plaza adjacent to the site of the church in which she delivered her famous "Aint I a Woman" speech. I was present as the producer for a new documentary by filmmaker and UCSD faculty Zeinabu irene Davis. Our team documented the plaza opening, conducted interviews with the people involved in making the plaza a reality and with local community members and historians around the impact of Sojourner Truth on Akron. While this trip is not specifically about my current research (as in I don't write about this film currently), BSP has supported my efforts in writing about the cultural value produced by Black women filmmakers over the last 50 years. [T]aken in Oliveira, Minas Gerais during a ritual procession called the Congado or Reinado. Black queens and kings are guided through the cobblestone streets to the center of town by marching, drum guards. Each year, they are coronated again as kings and queens as the participants celebrate in the name of one of several Black saints such as Santa Efigenia, Nossa Senhora Aparecida or São Benedito. Our Black Studies Project affiliated faculty are all over campus and beyond, developing critical thought, community, and scholarship.

Professor of Computer Science and Engineering Imani Munyaka and fellow researchers delivered a paper in the spring of 2024 titled *Are Robots Ready to Deliver Autism Inclusion?: A Critical Review.* Researchers "analyzed 142 human-robot interaction (HRI) papers published between 2016 and 2022 that explicitly identified autistic people as the end-users. They sought to determine whether autism is stigmatized in HRI research and to pinpoint how systemic social inequalities could be reproduced by them." Check out the *UC San Diego Today* article featuring Munyaka's advisee, first author Naba Rizvi discussing the work.

Congratulations to former BSP GSR and new faculty member **Dr. James Crawford** (Education Studies). Crawford joins the Teaching Faculty for Critical Community Engagement (CCE) in Eighth College. This year Crawford was also the recipient of the <u>inaugural Student Centeredness Award</u> for his work in the Teaching and Learning Commons.

Johnson's** recently published book, *Encyclopédie noire* received Winner of the 2024 Mary Alice and Philip Boucher Book Prize, French Colonial Historical Society; Honorable Mention, 2024 Gilbert Chinard Book Prize, Society for French Historical Studies; and Shortlist, 2024 Kenshur Prize for the Best Book in Eighteenth-Century Studies, Center for Eighteenth-Century Studies. *Encyclopédie noire* is currently a finalist for the Susanne M. Glasscock Book Prize, Melbern G. Glasscock Center for Humanities Research and a finalist for the 2024 Frederick Douglass Book Prize, Yale Gilder Lehrman Center for the Study of Slavery, Resistance, and Abolition for outstanding non-fiction book in English published on the subject of slavery, resistance, and/or abolition. She recently was interviewed about the book on the New Books Network and on KPFK with Professor Gerald Horne.
